Who are we?



Introduction to the ONS

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) is the UK's largest independent producer of official statistics. At ONS we collect and publish data about lots of topics, including:

- Prices of goods and products
- People and society
- Health and education





Using ONS Data

We make our data available for everyone to use and it's vitally important to us that you are able to access the data you need.

We publish data in various formats including:

- Data sets
- Statistical bulletins and analysis
- Data visualisation and interactive tools









How do we do this?

We collect this data in several ways, including through:

- Surveys
- Research
- Administrative data

Most of our surveys are voluntary and cover a variety of topics like the economy, employment and lifestyle. We also run the census in England and Wales.



The census



The census explained



- Population and migration statistics help us to accurately reflect the needs of everyone in society.
- One of the primary ways we collect statistics on population and migration is the census.
- The ONS is responsible for conducting the census in England and Wales every 10 years.
- Northern Ireland hold their own census around the same time. Scotland's census was in 2022.
- The census is important to local authorities, public bodies, businesses, voluntary organisations and academia amongst others.



Why we have a census

The census provides information that organisations, companies and government need to:

- Shape policy
- Allocate resources
- Plan services
- Monitor equality

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Phase 1 - First results

On 28 June 2022, we published the first results from Census 2021, in English and in Welsh.

Data

Population estimates, by sex and 5-year age groups, and household estimates for local authorities in England and Wales, rounded to the nearest 100.

A topic summary is a set of data and supporting information, grouped by a similar theme. The majority of the datasets that we will release as part of each topic summary will contain data about just one variable.

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Phase 2 – Deeper dive

We publish analysis and introduce granularity from Census 2021, in English and in Welsh.

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Phase 3 data



Later in 2023 we plan to publish further data, for example:

- Small populations; groups that are defined by their cultural background.
- Detailed migration statistics; provide the characteristics of people or households who have moved within the UK or from another country into the UK during the year before the census.
- Origin destination data or flow data; describes the movement of people from one location to another.
- Microdata samples; anonymised individual level records sampled from a single census



Analysis programme

From 2023 to 2025 we plan to publish analytical articles across 13 topic areas.



- Analysis will come in various forms, articles, interactive content and data tables help pull out key findings from census data.
- Early analytical articles focus on Census 2021 main findings about the usual resident population, then they will build in complexity, incorporating cross-cutting analyses, data linkage and longitudinal comparisons
- We have started publishing early analysis articles already



Census 2021 results compared to 2011 Census



Population change, England & Wales, Census 2011 vs 2021

- The population of England and Wales grew by more than 3.5 million since the last census in 2011
- □ The population grew in each of the nine regions of England and also grew in Wales; the region with the highest population growth was the East of England, which increased by 8.3% from 2011 (a gain of approximately 488,000 residents).
- Only 26 Local Authorities saw a decrease in population density from 2011





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Language, England and Wales: 2011 Census vs Census 2021



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Religion, England and Wales, 2011 2011 Census vs Census 2021

The religion question is voluntary and was answered by 94.0% of the usual population. An increase on 2011.

London remains the most religiously diverse region of England with 25.3% of all usual residents reporting a religion other than "Christian".

Improvement in health seen in most areas

After standardising for age differences most areas saw improvements in those reporting good health.

This does not mean there are not more people in poorer health – simply that once controlling for age the trend is different.

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Housing change 2011 Census vs Census 2021

Increases:



In 2021, there were 24.8 million households in England and Wales (up 6.1% from 23.4 million in 2011)

32.8% of households (8.1 million) owned the accommodation they lived in outright, an increase from 30.8% (7.2 million) in 2011

20.3% (5.0 million) rented their accommodation privately, up from 16.7% (3.9 million) in 2011

Decreases:

 29.7% (7.4 million) owned their accommodation with a mortgage or loan or shared ownership, which is a smaller proportion than in 2011 (33.5%, 7.8 million)

□17.1% (4.2 million) were in the social rented sector, for example through a local council or housing association; this is a smaller proportion than in 2011 (17.6%, 4.1 million)

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Accommodation type, England and Wales, 2011 Census vs Census 2021

Almost 8 in 10 households lived in houses or bungalows, however the proportion decreased across the last decade (from 78.6%, 18.4 million in 2011 to 77.9%, 19.3 million in 2021).

 The largest increase for any type of accommodation was for households in a flat, maisonette or apartment. In 2021, 21.7% (5.4 million) of households were in a flat, maisonette or apartment, up from 21.0% (4.9 million) in 2011.





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Navigating ONS data



How to access the data



Census 2021 outputs come in a range of different formats. Broadly speaking, outputs consist of:

- raw data from the census
- detailed analysis and further information about what the data shows
- information explaining how the data is categorised and defined
- interactive resources that help users visualise what the data shows for different areas
- materials and resources to help users communicate about the census.

Each of these outputs allows users to access and understand different elements of the census.

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Scrolly-telling population changes



The English region with the largest population increase was the East of England, which grew by around 8.3% or 488,000 more residents. The English region with the smallest increase was the North East, growing by 1.9% or around 50,000 people. In Wales, the population grew by 1.4% or 44,000 people.
