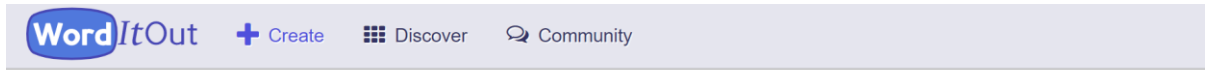




# Word Cloud Step by Step using Word It Out and Monkey Learn

### What's a word cloud?

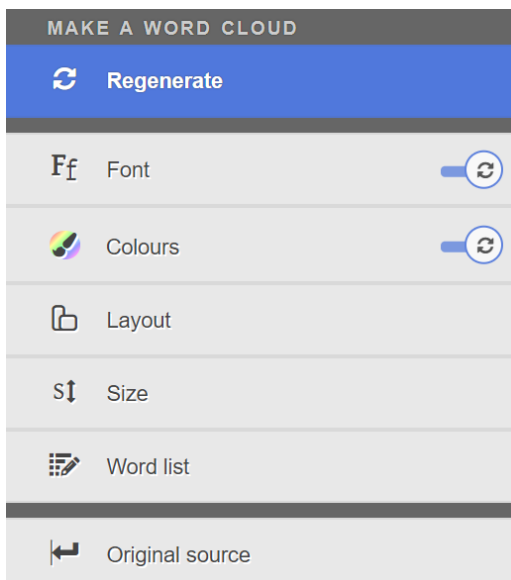
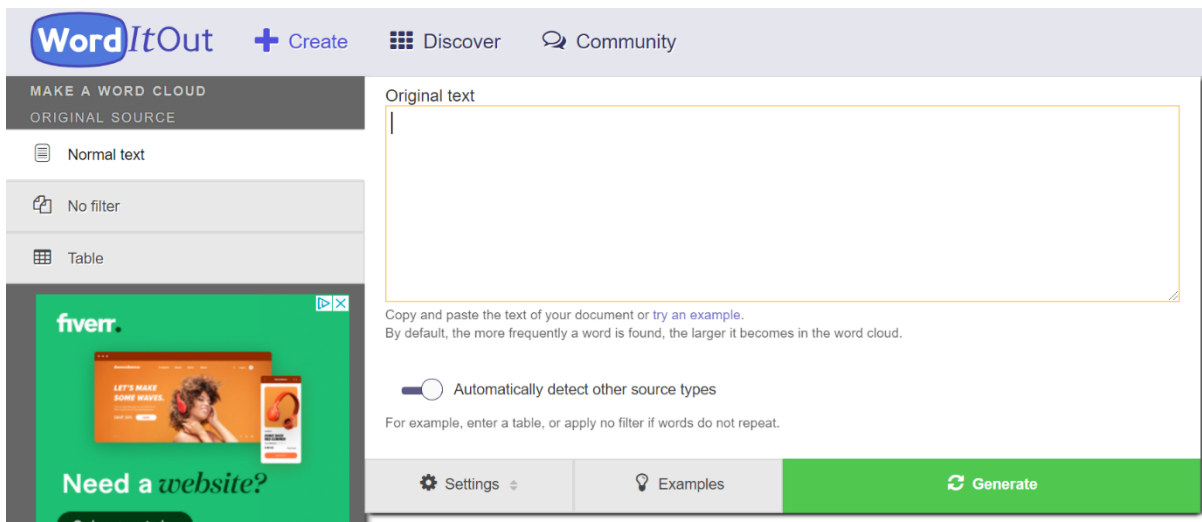
An attractive arrangement of randomly positioned words, where the most important words are bigger than the others.

### What are they for?

Mostly for fun! ...and now you can print them automatically onto items: a great idea for making custom gifts! Plus they are fantastic at summarising large documents (reports, speeches, questionnaires, etc), teaching kids and more...



- Now copy and paste your text into the Original text box



- Click on the left hand menu options of **Font**, **Colour**, **Layout** and **Size** to change the design of your word cloud.

*(Tip: Uncheck the Random on Regenerate option for Fonts)*

- Then click on **Regenerate** for your choices to be applied.

- Click on **Original source** to go back to the initial screen where you can select **Settings** and make changes to how words are included in your Word Cloud as follows:

- Changing the above to 2, now reduces the number of words appearing from 100 to 25, which will now display a Word Cloud as below:
- Remember to click on 'Regenerate' to see your changes made in the Word Cloud.
